## **Concentrating on Doing Good**

When Glenn and Lila Seager first agreed to host international visitors from Dubna, Russia, they had no idea how the experience would change their world.

The Seagers, who had seen very little of the world outside of the United States, say it sparked something in them. Since then, they have traveled around the world, visiting Turkey, Russia, Fiji and many other countries, their primary interest always being in relating to other people.

"It makes sense if we go to another country, to get close to their life and their community. We want to go to the churches and the museums, but we really want to see how they live day-to-day," says Lila. "The world is tightly integrated, more and more so. What happens elsewhere affects us sooner or later."

Glenn, a retired physician, is especially passionate about sharing health care knowledge. "If we have a program such as cancer care that another country wishes to learn about, then we need to share it. Providers in other countries learn these things when they work with World Services, and they are things we take for granted," he says. "Collaboration and exploration is new for some people." Over the years, the Seagers have hosted visitors from Vietnam, China, Russia, Belarus, Ukraine, Siberia and Iraq who have been here on exchanges covering everything from women's and children's health to recreation and tourism. The Seagers enjoy introducing them to the local lifestyle and region, including shopping, kayaking, food and other American experiences.

"When they leave here, our guests are more open than when they came," says Glenn. "They have a new understanding of Americans and a new light. They look like they've experienced something that's going to enrich their own lives and others' when they get home."

They've enriched ours, too, notes Lila. "As people, we all wish for the same. We all have the same hopes and desires for family, work and fun. And they want peace as much as we do. If more people would get involved internationally, we could have a greater impact on peace.

## Making the World a Little Better

As manager of *Hear With the Heart*, a nonprofit organnization in Kyrgyzstan that serves children and teens with hearing disabilities, Tatiana Kan was struggling to develop community support for her organization's mission.

Kyrgyzstan lacks diagnostic equipment, technology and the public awareness needed to integrate deaf people into the community of hearing people. Additionally, Tatiana notes, it has too few sign language interpreters, a shortage of cultural events and limited awareness among businesses regarding job placements.

Hoping to change all that, Tatiana sought out the "Youth Volunteerism in Community Development" Community Connections\* program, organized by World Services of La Crosse.

During the exchange, Tatiana and others in the program visited La Crosse, Wis., Lanesboro, Minn., and Chicago, Ill., where they met with universities and a variety of nonprofit organizations to learn how to integrate volunteers, technology, businesses and events and develop leadership skills.

The American way of thinking is radically different from the thinking of people of the former Soviet Union, says Tatiana. "I was particularly inspired by American attitudes toward volunteerism, philanthropy and charity."

Since returning to her native Kyrgyzstan, Tatiana has initiated several programs that are changing the way her community

views and interacts with people with disabilities. Among the most transformative, Tatiana is working with community leaders to provide sign language courses in Bishkek, the capital of Kyrgyzstan. Until now, only professionals—not parents, not friends—were trained in sign language. The course is the first step toward opening a school for sign language interpreters in the future.

She is also raising funds, recruiting volunteers and increasing awareness to support *Hear With the Heart's* mission. Drawing on the "Silent Luncheon" experience organized by Western Technical College students in La Crosse, Wis., as part of the exchange, Tatiana developed a new community event, a "Dinner in Silence." Guests socialized and dined in silence, using only hand signals, pictures and notes to communicate, and left with a new appreciation of how difficult it is to get acquainted, talk and share emotions without the advantage of speech.

Tatiana says her experience through World Services has not only exposed her to new ideas from Americans but it has also expanded her understanding of her own country's—and her own personal—ability.

"The people we met in the U.S. had a great influence on me. Many of them really make this world a little better," she says. "Thanks to them, I realized that I don't need to make any large-scale events to do a good thing. It's just enough to do something small, to make life better for at least one person."

## A World of Difference

Health care looks very different for people in the Republic of Georgia. Hospitals there lag behind U.S. standards when it comes to infection control, education and training, emergency planning and physician credentialing. It's a situation that affects patient safety and positive outcomes—and a situation World Services is working to change.

World Services partnered with World Learning/Georgia FORECAST, funded by USAID/Georgia, to guide the newly organized Georgia Hospital Association (GHA) in identifying problem areas and developing standards to address them standards that will be implemented throughout the country. The new standards focus on everything from training and regulation to advocacy and lobbying.

To further support GHA in making the vision a reality, World Services connected the organization with the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations. GHA has since been collaborating with the commission's international office in Europe to learn more about international standards for licensing and accrediting and how those processes may be adapted for use in Georgia. GHA now expects to have its first accredited hospitals as early as 2012, bringing a world of difference to the country's health care practices and hospitals and—most importantly—the five million Georgia citizens who rely on them. World Services makes real, practical and measurable changes in the lives of people around the globe. Examples include:

- Developing physician and professional credentialing system to ensure best practices and optimal outcomes for patient care.
- Educating communities about the social, emotional and financial cost of domestic violence and assisting them in developing programs to prevent and assist victims.
- Expanding tourism in ways that boost developing economies and employ more local people.
- Assisting health care organizations in developing organizational structures and budgets to ensure long-term viability while providing excellent care.
- Developing child abuse prevention and treatment systems and alternative family care systems to support vulnerable families and prevent abuse and neglect.
- Implementing smoking cessation programs to decrease the number of youth and young adult smokers.
